## Line

There are many kinds of lines. For example, lines can be long or short, think or thin, straight or curved or zig-zag. Lines may be vertical (like a flagpole) horizontal (like shelves) or diagonal (slanting). Lines may also be parallel (like the first two " 1 " in parallel) or perpendicular like the two lines that make an " $x$ ".

Lines also have emotional qualities. Curved lines are graceful and elegant. Angular or zig-zag lines suggest movement, energy or tension. Horizontal lines are stable and peaceful.
